Privacy Policy Statement

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery is committed to protecting your privacy and developing technology that gives you the most powerful and safe online experience. This Statement of Privacy applies to the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery web site and governs data collection and usage. By using the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery website, you consent to the data practices described in this statement.

Collection of your Personal Information

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery collects personally identifiable information, such as your e-mail address, name, home or work address or telephone number. The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery also collects anonymous demographic information, which is not unique to you, such as your ZIP code, age, gender, preferences, interests and favorites.

There is also information about your computer hardware and software that is automatically collected by the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery. This information can include: your IP address, browser type, domain names, access times and referring web site addresses. This information is used by the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery for the operation of the service, to maintain quality of the service, and to provide general statistics regarding use of the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery web site.

Please keep in mind that if you directly disclose personally identifiable information or personally sensitive data through the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery public message boards, this information may be collected and used by others. Note: The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery does not read any of your private online communications.

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery is not responsible for the privacy statements or other content on web sites outside of the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery and American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery family of web sites.

Use of your Personal Information

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery collects and uses your personal information to operate the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery web site and deliver the services you have requested. The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery also uses your personally identifiable information to inform you of other products or services available from the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery and its affiliates. The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery may also contact you via surveys to conduct research about your opinion of current services or of potential new services that may be offered.

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery does not sell, rent or lease its customer lists to third parties. The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery may, from time to time, contact you on behalf of external business partners about a particular offering that may be of interest to you. In

those cases, your unique personally identifiable information (e-mail, name, address, telephone number) is not transferred to the third party. In addition, the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery may share data with trusted partners to help us perform statistical analysis, send you email or postal mail, provide customer support, or arrange for deliveries. All such third parties are prohibited from using your personal information except to provide these services to the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery, and they are required to maintain the confidentiality of your information.

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery does not use or disclose sensitive personal information, such as race, religion, or political affiliations, without your explicit consent.

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery keeps track of the web sites and pages our customers visit within the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery, in order to determine what the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery services are the most popular. This data is used to deliver customized content and advertising within the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery to customers whose behavior indicates that they are interested in a particular subject area.

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery web sites will disclose your personal information, without notice, only if required to do so by law or in the good faith belief that such action is necessary to: (a) conform to the edicts of the law or comply with legal process served on American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery or the site; (b) protect and defend the rights or property of American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery; and, (c) act under exigent circumstances to protect the personal safety of users of American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery, or the public.

Use of Cookies

The American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery Web site use "cookies" to help you personalize your online experience. A cookie is a text file that is placed on your hard disk by a Web page server. Cookies cannot be used to run programs or deliver viruses to your computer. Cookies are uniquely assigned to you, and can only be read by a web server in the domain that issued the cookie to you.

One of the primary purposes of cookies is to provide a convenience feature to save you time. The purpose of a cookie is to tell the web server that you have returned to a specific page. For example, if you personalize the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery pages, or register with the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery site or services, a cookie helps the American Society for Reconstructive Microsurgery to recall your specific information on subsequent visits. This simplifies the process of recording your personal information, such as billing addresses, shipping addresses, and so on. Security of your Personal Information
